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Digenis Akritis : the Grottaferrata and Escorial versions ...  
The Grottaferrata version of the medieval Greek epic Digenis Akritis encompasses subtle self-consciousness of men 's position under gynocentrism. Romanos the Melodist 's sixth-century kontakia on Mary at the foot of the cross reflects gynocentrism, but uncritically. The kontakia 's representation of gynocentrism seems to result mainly from particular circumstances of symbolic competition.
